Have you heard about **STAT!Ref**, a new information gateway providing full-text access to 31 current medical textbooks? Or that starting in October, a new product will be available called **OVID ONLINE** that will allow you to search and print articles from 84 core clinical periodicals? Have you ever visited the UCONN-Storrs Library home page, where more than **200 databases** in a wide variety of subjects can be searched from your office in Farmington?

If you haven't been using this wealth of information from your UCHC desktop, then you might be missing vital, current health science information for patient care, research or instruction.

New Library Service ---UnipriNT

Starting August 14, 2000, the Library began using the Pharos UnipriNT system to charge for laser quality printing from our public access workstations. UCHC Vendacards can be used at the print workstation.

Why UnipriNT?

The purpose of using UnipriNT is to recover the cost of the increased amount of printing occurring in the Library and to reduce the unnecessary waste of paper and printing supplies. Online access to full-text journals, textbooks, databases, web-based teaching tools and syllabi created dramatic increases in the quantity of printing in the Library. At the same time, large amounts of printed materials were being discarded immediately.

The UnipriNT system is successfully operating at many other institutions including the UConn Storrs Library.

How does UnipriNT work?

- At a workstation in the Library, click on the print button, name your print job and walk to the print station.
- After the UCHC vendacard is inserted into the vendacard reader, find your job on a list at the print station.
- The number of pages and cost for printing will appear on the screen.
- If you decide to cancel, simply select "Exit". If you wish to proceed, click on "Print".

Other Options

- Four dot matrix printers are available to print brief citations, online catalog call numbers, etc.
- E-mail articles to yourself so that you can print or read from the screen later at home or your office.
- Download the articles or documents to a disk to print or read later.

Online courses can be taken on a time-available basis at considerably less money than the traditional CE/ vacation experiences enjoyed in the past.

DATABASE NEWS

Ovid Online: The Library's New **Databases and Subsequent Changes**

To provide the best service and resources we can afford, the Library is making available to our users Ovid Online, a gateway to 84 full-text journal titles, MEDLINE, Evidence Based Medicine and HAPI (Health and Psychological Instruments). database, which will replace our current locallymounted Ovid databases in a couple of months, is accessed via IP validation and no password is needed. Off campus access will be provided via a proxy server, a service that will soon be made public. Ovid Online is available through the Library's home page at http://library.uchc.edu (or by going directly to http://libdatabase.uchc.edu/databases/databases.asp)

We will replace our current locally-mounted Ovid databases with Ovid Online. We'll stop subscribing to two databases: Current Contents (C.C.) and CINAHL, although CINAHL will still be available from Storrs (like PsycInfo). As for C.C., we did a comparison study and found that of the 2,200 journal titles that are indexed in both C.C. Clinical Medicine and Life Sciences, only 275 are NOT indexed in MEDLINE. Of the 275, about 200 are indexed in Web of Science. By canceling C.C. and using MEDLINE and Web of Science for current awareness searches, we won't miss too many titles. Ralph Arcari, the Library Director, will present this C.C. issue to the Library Advisory Committee for more feedback, as this is the only database we will truly lose access to.

The National Library of Medicine's Consumer Health Initiative

The National Library of Medicine (NLM) has traditionally directed its services towards physicians and health professionals. In 1997, when NLM offered free public access to its premier database, MEDLINE.

http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pubmed, millions of healthcare consumers began searching the database.

Because MEDLINE is clinically oriented, the National Library of Medicine began developing resources for consumers.

MEDLINE plus, http://medlineplus.gov, and Clinical Trials, http://clinicaltrials.gov, are two new resources offered by NLM in response to the growing need for health information for the public. MEDLINE plus is a database of links to quality, full-text patient education information. The database may be browsed or searched by condition. Along with links to reliable information on diseases and other health concerns, MEDLINE plus includes a dictionary and drug information produced by the **US Pharmacopoeia**. Clinical Trials is a database of clinical trials taking place in the United States. Clinical Trials is searchable and may be browsed by condition or sponsor.

In addition to the MEDLINE plus and Clinical Trials databases, the National Library of Medicine has begun funding outreach services to the public. Outreach efforts come in the form of training for health information providers, the development of new tools for increasing public access to health information, and coordinated efforts to improve health information access to specific audiences. Public libraries are among NLM's many partners to ensure public access to quality health information. These efforts will continue as more consumers seek health information they can trust.

Traces the impact of such things as World War II, the National Institutes of Health, private medical insurance, Medicare and Medicaid on academic medical centers.

For the Record: Protecting Electronic Health Information

When you visit the doctor, information about you may be recorded in an office computer. Your tests may be sent to a laboratory or consulting physician. Relevant information may be transmitted to your health insurer or pharmacy. Your data may be collected by the state government or by an organization that accredits health care or studies medical costs. By making information more readily available to those who need it, greater use of computerized health information can help improve the quality of health care and reduce its costs. Yet health care organizations must find ways to ensure that electronic health information is not improperly divulged. Patient privacy has been an issue since the oath of Hippocrates first called on physicians to "keep silence" on patient matters, and with highly sensitive data--genetic information, HIV test results, psychiatric records--entering patient records, concerns over privacy and security are growing.

For the Record responds to the health care industry's need for greater guidance in protecting health information that increasingly flows through the national information infrastructure--from patient to provider, payer, analyst, employer, government agency, medical product manufacturer, and beyond. This book makes practical detailed recommendations for technical and organizational solutions and national-level initiatives.

For the Record describes two major types of privacy and security concerns that stem from the availability of health information in electronic form: the increased potential for inappropriate release of information held by individual organizations (whether by those with access to computerized records or those who break into them) and systemic concerns derived from open and widespread sharing of data among various parties. The committee reports on the technological and organizational aspects of security management, including basic principles of security; the effectiveness of technologies for user authentication, access control, and encryption; obstacles and incentives in the adoption of new technologies; and mechanisms for training, monitoring, and enforcement.

For the Record reviews the growing interest in electronic medical records; the increasing value of health information to providers, payers, researchers, and administrators; and the current legal and regulatory environment for protecting health data. This information is of immediate interest to policymakers, health policy researchers, patient advocates, professionals in health data management, and other stakeholders.
